INCLUDED GROUPS

- Health and Social Care
- · Education and childcare
- Key public services
- Local and National Government
- Food and other necessary goods
- Public safety and national security
- Transport
- Utilities, communication and financial services

FOOD AND OTHER NECESSARY GOODS

This includes those involved in food production, processing, distribution, sale and delivery, as well as those essential to the provision of other key goods (for example hygienic and veterinary medicines)

TRANSPORT

This includes those who will keep the air, water, road and rail passenger and freight transport modes operating during the COVID-19 response, including those working on transport systems through which supply chains pass

CCF ADVICE

- General rule is even those that can use this childcare should only do so if they really have to
- Provide employees with a generic letter stating they work in the food supply chain
- Essential maintenance functions/contractors assume they are covered

BUSINESS SUPPORT (ADDITIONAL FROM LAST WEEK)



- CORONAVIRUS JOB RETENTION SCHEME
 - Gov will pay 80% of wages up to cap of £2500
 - for workers designated as 'furloughed'
- VAT
 - all VAT payments deferred for 3 months
 - no VAT will be collected until 30 June 2020
- CORONAVIRUS BUSINESS INTERRUPTION LOANS
 - interest free for one year (extended from 6 months)

VEHICLES AND DRIVERS



DRIVERS HOURS EXTENSION

- · for delivery of essential goods
- for all haulage

MOT EXTENSION – automatic extension for all for 3 months except

- any vehicle that needs a first MOT (annual test) before 31 March 2020
- a vehicle or trailer returning to service where the test certificate expired before March 2020
- a vehicle needing a dangerous goods (ADR) test before 31 March 2020

DRIVING TESTS

- all cancelled for three months
- except for tests for key workers

SANITATION AND FACILITY CLEANING



- FSA and international food safety state it is 'highly unlikely' that covid-19 is transmitted via food
- PHE have made clear that your existing risk based approach to facility cleaning is sufficient
- PHE updated guidance on facility cleaning has been provided if covid-19 affected people have used the space

CCF CALLING FOR EXTENSION OF THE SAME DEROGATION TO BUSINESSES ACROSS THE WHOLE SUPPLY CHAIN



That's why the CMA welcomes the Government's announcement today to relax some elements of competition law to help supermarkets work together

Where agreements are not covered by that legal relaxation, the CMA can offer the following reassurance: the CMA has no intention of taking competition law enforcement action against cooperation between businesses or rationing of products to the extent that this is necessary to protect consumers – for example, by ensuring security of supplies.

At the same time, the CMA will not tolerate unscrupulous businesses exploiting the crisis as a 'cover' for non-essential collusion. This includes exchanging information on longer-term pricing or business strategies, where this is not necessary to meet the needs of the current situation. More guidance on this will follow from the CMA in due course.

The CMA trusts that these announcements will reassure businesses, which it knows are doing their best in difficult circumstances to meet the needs of the public. Businesses must still be aware that any assurance given by the CMA cannot protect against competition litigation by private parties, but wants to offer comfort on its own approach.
